Reading with your child



We always ask you to hear your child read and thought perhaps we should offer you some ideas how! After the end of a school day most of our younger children are excited about doing something they choose to do! It's a very busy life, so here are some tips which may help.

- Choose a time when your chid naturally wants to sit down. After dinner, after a hot drink, after swimming . . .
- Sit in a comfortable place where your child likes to be.
- Talk about what is happening in the pictures throughout the book.
- Ask your child if they like a character and why.
- If you like drama, perhaps see if you can act out a part of the story together.
- If your child gets stuck on a word, try sounding through the letters, or read on to the end of the sentence. The unknown word might become clearer as it will make sense to the meaning.
- Pretend that you didn't understand the story very well and ask your child to retell it to you in their own words.
- If your child enjoyed the story, encourage them to read or retell it to somebody else.
- Ask your child to scan the page for a particular word.
- Ask your child to scan the book for the words that describe . . . for example: the treasure chest.
- Point out questions/exclamation marks and how they should change their voice. Have fun trying to say the same line in different ways!
- Tape your child's reading session and play it back. Children love to hear the sound of their own voices!
